The Municipality is welcoming newcomers - from starting your life as a family to making it your retirement home, Rossburn is a great place to live for everyone in all stages of life!



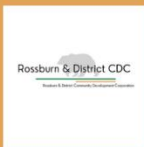
Discover Our Nature!

Reaching Rossburn

Via plane

The nearest (international) airports to Rossburn are Winnipeg Richardson International Airport (YWG), Manitoba, and Regina International Airport (YQR), Saskatchewan. From both airports, you will have to arrange to drive to Rossburn for about 3.5 hours. Consider renting a car at the airport, as there is no public transportation to Rossburn. You can connect to cities closer by, like Yorkton and Melville, SK, or Brandon and Roblin, MB, by public transportation.

Keep in mind that you must go through immigration at your port of entry to the country, which is the first airport you arrive at in Canada. This takes additional time, so make sure you have enough time to catch your connecting flight.

Via car

To reach Rossburn via car:

From direction Winnipeg (East)

- Take the Trans Canada Highway 1 West, after Minnedosa, turn onto Highway 16 West
- Once you reach Shoal Lake, turn north onto Highway 21 and then, in Oakburn, West on Highway 45 to reach Rossburn

From Regina (West)

- Take Highway 10 North East to Melville, then turn onto Highway 15 West
- You reach Highway 16 East, follow it until Russell
- Turn onto Highway 45 East to reach Rossburn

New to Canada

Moving to a new country can be everything from confusing to funny to scary! We wish you a warm welcome to Canada. Hoping to make your start in this wonderful country a little easier, here is some information for newcomers to (rural) life in Canada.

The following section of the newcomer guide is designed for newcomers to the country. If you are moving within Canada or Manitoba, you can probably skip to [‘New to Rosssburn / Manitoba’](#).

This information covers the most basic steps for what to do when you arrive in Canada. We highly recommend using other resources and doing your own research. We also included some helpful tips and additional information in the second part of this publication for newcomers to Canada.

Documents / Identification

As soon as you arrive, you should apply for the following Canadian / Manitoban documents.

Social Insurance Number Card (SIN)

If you are a Canadian citizen, a permanent resident, or a temporary resident, you need a Social Insurance Number (SIN) to work in Canada or to receive benefits and services from government programs. All adults in your family need to apply separately. Children 12 years of age and older (or their legal guardian) may apply for a SIN.

You will need to provide one of the following:

- Primary identity document proofing your identity and status in Canada
- Secondary identity document proving your identity

All documents must be presented as original copies. They must be in either English or French, or you need a translation. Depending on your status in Canada, the required documents differ. Find out more here: [Social Insurance Number: Required documents - Canada.ca](#)

The quickest and easiest way to receive your SIN is to apply in person at a scheduled outreach site or Service Canada Centre. You can also apply online.

Appointments are for walk-in only. It is recommended to be there early, as it is first-come, first-served and usually busy.

Manitoba Health Card

As a Canadian Citizen / permanent resident or (under specific criteria) as a temporary resident, you should be eligible to register for Manitoba Health. You will need to register for a Manitoba Health Card. Basic health care is free; however, there may be a charge for other services (such as eye exams, physiotherapy, or dental care).

You are encouraged to apply for a Manitoba Health Card within three months of moving to Manitoba. If you come to Manitoba from outside of Canada, you will need to prove your legal status and your residence in Manitoba. Depending on current processing times, it may take several weeks to receive your health card.

You can easily check your eligibility for a Manitoba Health Card online. For a full list of covered and not-covered services, as well as detailed instructions on how to apply, visit the Manitoba government website:

You can expand your medical coverage with private health insurance. Employers may offer health benefit plans for employees. Private health insurance provides various plans that can cover costs not covered by public health insurance. If your employer does not provide health benefits, you can purchase health insurance on your own for you and your family. There are different providers for public health insurance, for example, Manitoba Blue Cross or Sun Life Canada.

Canadian Dental Care Plan

The Canadian Dental Care Plan (CDCP) is a federal program that helps pay a portion of the cost for a wide range of oral health care services. The CDCP will reimburse a portion of the treatment cost, but it may not cover the full amount, depending on your income.

You might be eligible if you don't have access to dental insurance, filed your tax return in Canada in the previous year, your adjusted family net income is less than \$90,000, and you're a Canadian resident for tax purposes.

Manitoba Driver's License

As a new resident of Manitoba, you can drive a passenger vehicle or motorcycle with your valid licence for up to three months. After this period, you are required to obtain a Manitoba Driver's License. In Manitoba (and Canada), a driver's license serves as a photo ID. It helps you access a variety of services whenever you need to prove your identity (like opening a bank account or applying for a credit card).

To apply for your driver's license, you need to visit a Manitoba Public Insurance Service Centre / Autopac agent. Bring a valid identity document and your valid out-of-province driver's license. You might need a translation of your documents if they are not in English or French. Once your application is successfully processed, your driver's license will be sent to you via mail.

If you move from another country that is not on the reciprocal country list, you will have to pass Manitoba's knowledge and road tests.

You pay annually for your driver's license. If you keep driving safely, your licence (and insurance) will cost less over time.

Phone / Internet

Cellphone & Landline

As soon as you arrive in Canada, you should get a Canadian SIM card for your cellphone.

In general, there is a wide variety of phone plans to choose from.

You should decide on:

- Prepaid vs. postpaid plan = You pay a fixed amount with certain services included, vs. you receive a bill at the end of the month and pay only for services used
- Plan with 'Bring your own phone' vs. 'Buy a new phone' = You use the new SIM card with your own phone, vs. You pay extra to receive a phone with your SIM card.

You can compare different phone plans online and decide which one fits best for your needs. Ask yourself questions like: How much data do I need? Do I need unlimited calling and messaging? Do I need to have international phone calls included?

Most providers offer 'extras' that allow for long-distance calls. Consider using other online services, such as WhatsApp, Facebook, or Zoom, to make free worldwide calls over the Internet.

Before choosing a provider, make sure their coverage is good enough for our rural area. You can usually check this on the provider's website.

The big three providers in Canada are: Bell MTS, Rogers, and Telus

There are cheaper options that use the bigger provider's networks as sub-brands (like Koodoo, Fido, or Chatr Mobile)

If you also want a landline (a fixed-line phone connected to the phone system by a wire, commonly used in homes and offices), there are various plans and providers available. Bell MTS, Rogers, and Telus offer home phone plans.

Internet

For Internet services (= WiFi or LAN connections in your home), you can refer to the same three big providers as for cellphone services.

There is also Xplornet for rural broadband services and Starlink satellite internet for remote areas.

Compare plans and speeds before choosing and consider bundling internet with other services (like phone or cellphone).

45 Networks provides unlimited wireless Internet service, as well as wired and wireless network consulting, sales, installation, troubleshooting, and surveillance systems for homes, farms, and businesses.

Money / Banking / Taxes

As soon as you arrive, you should open a bank account. Most banks offer similar services; however, the fees charged can vary. You can compare banks online or in person by visiting a branch to find the best option for your needs. If you are unsure what your banking needs are, research online or visit a branch to talk to an advisor in person.

Different account types

Chequing accounts are used to pay bills, such as rent, insurance, and utilities. You can set up automatic payment for some bills. You receive a debit card and a Personal Identification Number (PIN) to memorize. You can use your debit card for most purchases at stores and for cash withdrawals at an Automated Teller Machine (ATM).

Saving accounts hold money that you do not want to spend right away. The bank pays interest on the money in a savings account. You can withdraw this money at any time.

You can apply for a credit card with every bank. While a debit card is sufficient to pay for your daily needs, you need a credit card to set up some automatic payments (for example, a phone contract) and to pay for bigger purchases. Your bank determines your credit card limit based on your credit score and income.

Cash

You can withdraw cash at ATMs in every bank branch; fees may apply if the ATM is not your bank's. Further ATMs are located at the Parkway Co-op C-Store / Gas Bar (21 Main Street) and The Oasis – Rossburn Hotel (31 Centennial Road).

Many stores offer alternative payment options, but it is still recommended always to carry a small amount of cash.

Investments

Most banks offer other options for saving or investing money, such as the Tax-Free Savings Accounts (TFSA) or Guaranteed Investment Certificates (GICs). They pay higher interest but come with more restrictions on withdrawals.

Everyone working in Canada can set up a Registered Retirement Savings Plan (RRSP). This lets you save money and reduce your taxes. The amount you can save depends on your annual employment income.

There are many different banks you could use, especially if you mainly use online banking services. If you intend to visit a branch occasionally, one of the local banks is your best option:

Sending money internationally

Most banks offer options to send money internationally. However, fees apply, so check with your advisor. There are other providers, such as Wise or PayPal, that might offer more attractive offers.

Taxes

In Canada, you must file your tax return every year. Depending on your income, you might get a tax refund or owe taxes and need to pay the Canada Revenue Agency (CRA). As a newcomer to the country, you will have to file your taxes for the first time in the spring of the year following your arrival. Tax season typically runs from late February until the end of April, and returns must be submitted by April 30 to avoid penalties. Make sure to keep track of your income and expenses throughout the year and consider using tax software or working with an accountant to help you file.

Weather / Climate / Wildlife

Weather & Climate

Manitoba has a continental climate, with significant differences between summer and winter temperatures, resulting in hot summers and cold, dry winters.

Winter preparedness

Extreme weather conditions, including heavy snowfall and frigid temperatures down to -40° C, can occur during the winter months. You should invest in proper winter clothing. Buy these items in Canada; the ones from your home country might not be sufficient, depending on where you come from.

Winter is a beautiful season in our area, but do not underestimate the potential risks that come with frigid temperatures. Inform yourself about winter driving, learn how to prevent frostbite and hypothermia, and stock up on home emergency supplies.

Summers in Manitoba

Summers can be very hot, with temperatures ranging from 25 to 35 °C. It is recommended to use sunscreen when spending time outdoors. Watch children and pets for signs of heat exhaustion and do not leave them unattended in the car, even with the windows open.

BE PREPARED

Home Emergency Supplies

All households should have 14 days of emergency supplies on hand in the event you are unable to leave your home.

- 4 litres of water (per person per day)
- Non-perishable food
- Manual can opener
- Candles & matches
- Fuel operated stove or barbecue (outdoors)
- First aid kit
- ABC fire extinguisher
- Cash (\$50.00)
- Personal hygiene items
- Toilet paper, garbage bags with ties & baby wipes
- Emergency Response Information Kit (ERIK)
- Digital & physical copies of important documents
- Water purification straws or sanitation tablets
- Mobile device back up batteries & charging blocks with extra cables
- Back-up generator
- Radio
- Flashlight

Review the items in your kit every 6 months and replace any items that have been used or have expired.

Manitoba

Throughout May to the end of July, wood ticks are active in Manitoba. They are small animals that live in tall grass or on trees and bushes. They will attach to your clothing and try to latch onto your body to feed on your blood. Usually, they try to find hot and humid spots. While you are outside and after, check for ticks crawling on or attached to you. They can carry diseases. Learn how to properly remove them and take precautions against them, such as tucking your pants into your socks or wearing light-colored pants to see them better.

Manitoba also has a very active mosquito population. While they usually do not carry diseases in our area, they are annoying, and their bites itch. Buy mosquito repellent to deter them and products like “Afterbite” to ease the swelling and itch of bites.

Wildlife

In our area, you might encounter wildlife that you are not familiar with. Manitoba is home to black bears, wolves, coyotes, cougars, elk, moose, and much more.

In general, there is little risk associated with wildlife encounters you are prepared and behave in an appropriate way towards wildlife. Keep a safe distance from all wildlife, do not try to feed them, and stick to ‘Leave no Trace’ principles.

BE BEAR SMART
WHEN IN BLACK BEAR COUNTRY

Never feed or approach a bear, or any wild animal.

- Be alert
- Make noise
- Travel in groups
- Keep dogs on leash
- Keep bear spray handy & know how to use it
- Store food & garbage where bears can't access it
- Never leave food unattended
- Leave only footprints behind (not garbage)

WHEN ENCOUNTERING A BEAR

- Stop and assess the situation and the bear's response.
- During a surprise encounter, slowly back away and prepare to deploy bear spray.
- If the bear charges, stand your ground and use your bear spray.
- If the bear attacks during a surprise encounter, play dead.
- If the bear persistently stalks you and then attacks, fight back.
- If the bear attacks you in your tent, fight back.

Bears should neither be feared nor dismissed as harmless, but should be respected for the potential danger they pose.

Housing

When moving to Rossburn, you should secure housing in advance. You can either find a house or apartment for rent or purchase a home. In general, there is limited rental housing available in the Rossburn Municipality, so it is common to buy a house sooner rather than later.

Rental Housing

If you look for rental housing, it is recommended that you visit the unit in person before you sign anything. Once you agree to rent, you usually sign a Tenancy Agreement with your landlord. You agree to pay a fixed monthly rent. The landlord may ask you to sign a lease. This means you must agree to live in the apartment/ house for a specific period of time and specify how much notice you must give before you can move out. Make sure you know

- What utilities are included, like gas, hydro (= electricity), water, cable. Some services you might need to arrange for yourself (like the internet).
- Whether pets are allowed.
- What date the rent is due.

Buying your own home

You may need to establish a credit rating in Canada before you can get a mortgage (a loan for a home). With a mortgage, you must pay a 10% to 35% down payment. A bank provides you with a loan for the rest of the cost. You need to pay back this loan within a fixed timeframe, with fixed amounts, and you pay interest. If you need a loan to purchase a house, you will have to talk to a banking advisor (see local banks).

If you want to purchase a Ready-To-Move-Home or get a home built for you, you can buy an empty lot in or around Rossburn. Make sure to obtain the appropriate approvals and permits before you start – contact the municipal office to begin this process.

Writing resumes & cover letters? Good to know: Tailor each resume and cover letter to the job posting. Include only relevant work experience. Do not add personal details like age, gender, marital status, or photos.

Mails / Letters / Postage

Canada Post provides most postal services in Canada. Deliveries can also be done by courier services (Purolator, FedEx, UPS).

There is no mail delivery to your house. Instead, you will collect your mail at your personal mailbox (PO box). You can access your postbox 24/7.

You should sign up for a personal post office box as soon as possible, in person at the post office during opening hours.

At any post office, you can:

- Drop mail to be delivered
- Buy stamps and money orders
- Have packages or larger letters weighed to get the correct postage

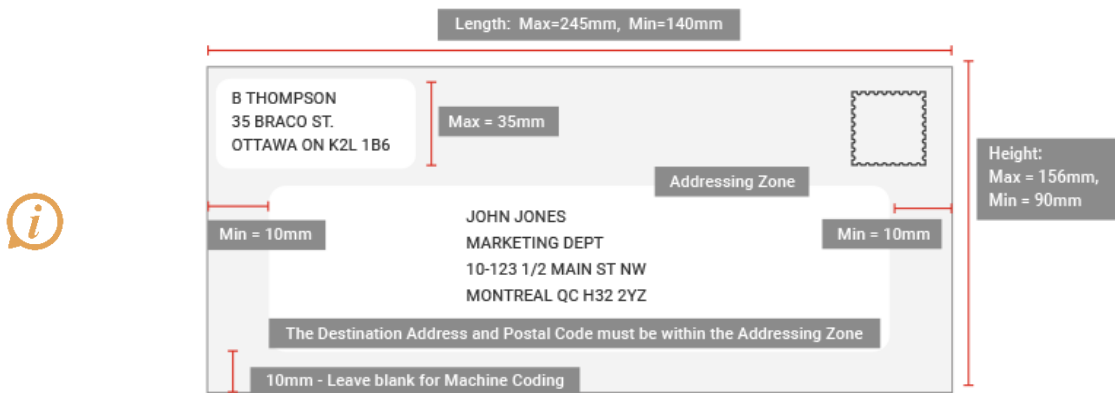

Utilities / Administration

If you live within town limits, the Municipality provides essential services to support your home, including water, wastewater (sewer), garbage, and recycling collection. For residents in rural areas, water supply and sewage systems are privately maintained, giving you the flexibility to manage services that best suit your property.

Water and Sewer

Drinking water within town limits is treated and safe for everyday use. Each dwelling in town is equipped with municipal water and sewer connections. Water and sewer services are metered and billed on a quarterly basis. Water meters are read remotely by the Municipal Water and Wastewater Staff.

For issues affecting services outside your home, please contact the municipal office. For plumbing concerns inside your residence—such as a running toilet or plugged drain—a licensed plumber should be contacted.

In rural areas, most homes rely on a private well located on the property for their water supply. Homeowners are responsible for the operation, maintenance, and regular testing of their well to ensure safe drinking water.

For information, guidance, or concerns about drinking water safety, you can contact the Office of Drinking Water at **204-945-5762** or by email at odw@gov.mb.ca. They can provide advice on water testing, treatment options, and best practices for maintaining a safe and reliable water source.

Electricity

Manitoba Hydro provides electricity in Manitoba.

You may need to have electricity connected, and a fee may be charged. If your property is already linked to Manitoba Hydro, you only need to call with your address, and the billing will be changed to your name. Most services are also available online if you register for an online account.

Power Outages

You may experience power outages, especially during winter. Some of these are planned outages, and others are unexpected. Usually, they last only a short time, but in severe cases, you might be without power for a day. Manitoba Hydro provides a map with outages as well as recommendations for preparing for a power outage and for dealing with one if it occurs.

Garbage Collection and Disposal

For residents living within town limits, garbage collection takes place weekly on Mondays between 8:00 a.m. and 11:00 a.m. Please ensure garbage is set out only on collection day. It is recommended that garbage be placed out at the curb in a closed container to prevent access by animals.

The Waste Grounds include:

- A landfill building for household waste storage
- An Eco-Centre for used oil, oil products, antifreeze, and antifreeze containers
- A used tire storage area for tires without rims, organized by size
- A metal depot for larger metal items
- A burn area for clean burnable materials only, such as untreated wood, tree trimmings, and straw

Residents living outside of town limits are responsible for managing their own garbage and are welcome to use the landfill for waste disposal.

Recycling Program

Recycling collection for residents of the Town of Rossburn takes place on Wednesday mornings. Recyclable materials should be placed in a Blue Box recycling bin and set out at the curb by 8:00am. Blue Box bins are available through the Municipality for your convenience.

For residents living outside of town limits, a recycling depot is available at the north end of the Rossburn Collegiate Institute parking lot. The depot is open 24 hours a day, 7 days a week, making it easy to drop off recyclables at a time that works best for you.

Contact the municipal office for details about animal control and pet ownership responsibilities within the Municipality.

On rural property, all domesticated farm animals are allowed (horses, cattle, pigs, chickens, sheep, goats, etc.).

The two closest veterinarians are in Russell and Shoal Lake (belongs to Virden Animal Hospital), both for small and large animals.

Personal vehicles

It is essential to know that there is no regular public transportation available in Rossburn. A personal vehicle is your best option in any case.

To operate a vehicle on the roadway in Manitoba, you must have a valid vehicle registration and Autopac insurance.

- Bill of Sale including date purchased, vehicle's model year, make, model, and serial number; purchase price; purchaser's name(s); seller's name(s); purchaser's signature(s), and seller's signature(s).
- A signed Transfer of Ownership Document from the previous owner.
- Valid Certificate of Inspection issued by a Manitoba vehicle inspection station (only applies to used cars)

Drinking and Driving

Impaired driving (= driving under the influence of alcohol or drugs) is illegal in Manitoba, and you might face legal consequences and financial penalties. The police can stop you and check your Blood Alcohol Content (BAC) through a breath or blood test if they think you are not driving safely. In Manitoba, the legal limit for blood alcohol concentration (BAC) is 0.08 percent. However, even a BAC of 0.05 is considered a "warning" and can lead to immediate license suspension. Via Rail

To travel via train, you can use Via Rail Canada, the only railway provider in our area. There is no railway station in Rossburn. Your nearest railway stations are in Roblin (~1 hour drive) and Rivers (~1 hour and 10 minutes drive). There, you have access to the railway line, leading North towards Churchill, MB, and South to Winnipeg. You need to arrange private transportation to reach the railway stations.

In Winnipeg, you can get on the Western Canada railway line, leading West to Vancouver via Edmonton and leading East to Toronto. While the train is an excellent way to travel and explore the country, Via Rail is known for extensive delays. Keep this in mind if you use the train for scheduled appointments.

Most people have a family doctor or a nurse practitioner whom they see for general health problems or for regular check-ups. To see a specialist, you usually need a referral from your family doctor. Manitoba Health covers most services that you can access in the medical clinic.

Make an appointment before coming to the clinic. The clinic is open from Monday to Friday.

 Remember to apply for a Manitoba Health card if you move to Rossburn from outside the province, ideally before you access medical services.

Child Care / School / Parenting

Childcare & School System in Manitoba



In Manitoba, children are required by law to attend school from the time they reach compulsory school age (6 years of age or will be reaching 6 years of age by December 31 in a given calendar year) until they attain the age of 18. The school year generally is from September to June, with weeks off for Christmas and Spring Break. The school provides a calendar of additional days off.

Education is free for citizens and Landed Immigrants (excluding the cost of supplies or field trips). School bus pickup at the yard entrance is available in all rural areas for children attending the public school system.

Your child is not required to speak English before enrolling in a school in Manitoba. The school will assess your child within their first few days or weeks. Your child will receive appropriate educational support based on their level and progress.

You must register your children with the local school.

Parenting in Manitoba / Canada



Child abuse is illegal in Manitoba / Canada, and you will face legal consequences. In Manitoba, it is everyone's legal obligation to report suspected child abuse.

If you think a child is being harmed or neglected, contact Child and Family Services (CFS) at 1 (866) 345-9241. In an emergency, contact the police (911).

What is child abuse?

- physical injury to the child
- emotional disability of a permanent nature in the child, or is likely to result in such a disability
- sexual exploitation of the child with or without the child's consent

Child neglect is the failure of a child's primary caregiver to provide adequate food, clothing, shelter, supervision, and/or medical care. Child neglect is an act of omission by a parent or guardian, resulting in (or likely to result in) harm or risk of damage to a child.



Other important information:

- Tax-deductibles: Childcare costs are tax-deductible if parents are working. Keep receipts from babysitters and day care services.
- Support for parents: The best person to call first is a public health nurse at 204 859-5302.

- Canada Child Benefit (CCB): You can apply for CCB. This tax-free monthly payment helps families with the cost of raising children under 18 years old, and the amount you receive is based mainly on your family's income from the previous year.
- Supervision: By law, a child under 12 should not be left unattended without "reasonable provision having been made for his or her supervision and safety". Parents should therefore ensure proper supervision.
